Over the years, Barbie wore many hats as volunteer and donor that includes being part of an annual breakfast fundraiser, dinner volunteering, and playing a very important role as Brunch coordinator in the 1990's.

Jodi followed in the footsteps of her mother in giving and caring for the homeless. She continues until today as a playgroup volunteer and just like her mother, she introduced her wonderful daughters to the shelter. Jodi said, "What I like most about the shelter is that it helps families who have fallen upon hard times by giving them a hand up, not a handout. The shelter gets them out there looking for jobs and/or housing since there is a predetermined amount of time that they can stay at the shelter. I also like that the kids have the opportunity to take a break from their parents by going to the playroom - all families need their own space sometimes!"

Volunteers like Barbie, Jodi, Kyra and Emma make our service for the families going through homelessness meaningful. We at St Mary's shelter are truly blessed to have this incredible family of three generation as our

Tucked away on a remote, side street on the outskirts of Phoenixville sits a very special home. A nondescript home that has provided safe and temporary shelter for vulnerable homeless families since 1987. The home, like homeless families, is in the shadows of other homes and hidden from those outside its immediate walls. We simply do not think of entire families as being homeless.

However, that thought entered the minds and hearts of two Sisters of Saint Francis who saw this concern and decided to seek a solution. Saint Francis told us, "Start by doing what's necessary; then do what's possible; and suddenly you are doing the impossible." And that is how it all began!

Since 1987, St. Mary's has:

- Housed over 640 families as Shelter Guests;
- Provided more than 120,000 nights of temporary emergency housing to families, individuals, children
- Served in excess of 345,000 meals to Shelter Guests; and
- Annually cared for 25% of the homeless families in Chester County.

This may be "doing the impossible" but in fact it is just the beginning. St. Mary's continues to grow and thrive in the midst of so many loving and dedicated volunteers, donors, staff persons, local churches and non-profits. We delight in knowing the kindnesses that come our way each and every day. We know how very blessed we are and we do not take this for granted.

Saint Mary's was born from the love, courage, good humor and collaboration of so many faithful people in the Phoenixville community. Today, St. Mary's continues and dare we say thrives with these same graces and collaborators. We remember each of the families all 641 of them, finding shelter under the roof at 209 Emmett Street! An amazing feat thanks to all of you!
